A SPECIAL ALTRUISTIC NEWSLETTER

Welcome to a special issue featuring altruism as the main topic. Sisters have been quizzing me and asking which projects are considered as "HADK projects?" Since I have been learning more about our altruistic program this year, I would like to share what I have learned. We can use this article as a way of clarifying things for all of us.

Right now, the "All-HADK projects" are the four-five altruistic organizations which are selected each biennium. We recently selected the 2021 organizations through the State Altruistic Committee. All members made their choices known through chapter voting. The selected organizations are awarded a monetary donation (approximately \$1,000 each) from HADK. The State Science Bowl is another All-HADK altruistic activity, and WeVoteHawaii was one a few years ago. (continue on page 2)

SOMETHING NEW! Please Join Me!

I was deeply touched when I read articles regarding the DigDeep Navajo Water Project and how the Covid virus affected the Navajo people. Can you



imagine not having running water at home? Or having no electricity? I am personally supporting this project by creating a "President's Altruistic Project" and inviting you and your chapters to join me.

It's easy to do. Just get an empty water bottle and start collecting dimes. Read about this project in the article to the right. → It will still take years to complete the DigDeep project. But you may take satisfaction in knowing that your help will eventually bring running water for the homes in this Navajo Reservation by digging deep to find new wells with clean water for them.

DigDeep Navajo Water Project

- Did you know that most of the Navajo people living in the "Navajo Nation" Reservation are without running water and electricity? Access to water is usually miles away so the water must be rationed.
- The Navajo people were deeply affected by the pandemic restrictions because they were forced to stay home to avoid being Covid infected. Thus, having water was a major problem since they had to depend on volunteers to bring the water to them. This resulted in many deaths due to Covid.
- The "DigDeep Navajo Water Project" was established to help bring a source of running water to the homes by asking for donations.

- I am inviting <u>HAΔK Chapters</u> to join me and help support this worthy project by encouraging their members to save dimes in a small empty water bottle from June I through December 31, 2021. Make it a summer project and keep it going into the 2nd half of the biennium. Of course this is purely voluntary but, I hope you will join me.
- ♣ More information will be forthcoming as to how the money will be collected together. Let's make good use of a water bottle to collect the dimes, and to help out the residents living in the "Navajo Nation."

Navajo Nation is a 27,000 square miles area extending into the states of Arizona, New Mexico, and Utah. This is the largest land area retained by an indigenous tribe in the United States. The reservation, established in 1868, is one of a few indigenous nations whose reservation lands overlap its traditional homelands.



While we all participate in various altruistic activities, they are generally initiated by chapters. Often, some chapters will ask other chapters or members to participate. For example, Zeta started Sew-a-Lei for Memorial Day a few years ago and eventually invited other chapters to join in. Now, it is a regular activity with several chapters. Just recently, Xi and Nu chapters sponsored the UH Kākoʻo project, and invited others to participate. Perhaps one day, other chapters may decide to make it a regular chapter altruistic project for them. Chapters can send out messages via the State committee, inviting others to participate, making it seem like it is an "HAAK activity." While it may look like a state activity, it is simply chapters in HAAK participating in the activity.

Finally, the state altruistic committee will remind and encourage chapters to support the two International A Δ K altruistic projects (which happens to be the Alzheimer's Association and St. Jude
